ABOUT THIS REPORT

This report summarizes information about the Dayton Region’s international connections, including residents who moved from abroad as well as local influences abroad. Over the last few years, the Dayton Region has concentrated efforts on strengthening the area’s relationship with international residents and businesses. Part of these efforts included the creation of Welcome Dayton (www.welcomedayton.org), which earned the city of Dayton the status of first Certified Welcoming city in the country on September 13, 2017, by Welcoming America, an American globally recognized organization. Welcome Dayton is a rich resource guide for both locally born Dayton residents and new residents alike.

Note: 1) Welcoming America launched the Certified Welcoming program in April 2017 to establish a formal designation for cities and counties that have taken action on their commitment to be welcoming and have met the high bar set by the Welcoming Standard. 2) Welcoming Standard: Captures the core of what it means to be an inclusive community. Developed in collaboration with local governments, advocates, and diverse experts, and input from the public at large, the Standard provides a comprehensive roadmap for immigrant inclusion. About the Data

The research team used well-known, trusted data sources to gather the data found in the following tables. In some instances the local team from Montgomery County had information that conflicted with or added to the publicly available data sources; in those instances the team made slight modifications to the data based on the new information available. Wherever the data in the summary tables differs from the source listed, the research team included a note.



About the Data (continued)

All the data tables include information on timeframe and source. Unless otherwise noted, data include a 5-county region around Dayton that incorporates: Darke, Greene, Preble, Miami, and Montgomery counties. Due to the availability of certain data sources most of the data are from 2017 or 2018, though some are older.

In some instances global, international, or world are used in place of foreign (for example, world languages).



PEOPLE

The U.S. Census, which is the primary data source used in this section, distinguishes between the foreign-born population and other residents. Throughout the summary report and country profiles foreign-born residents are referred to as international residents of the Dayton Region. About 4% of the Dayton Region's residents were born in another country, mainly in Asia. The most common countries of origin are India, China, and Mexico. Although most residents speak English, even if they were born elsewhere, the most common non-English language spoken is Spanish. This section looks closely at international trends of the Dayton Region's residents to set the stage for the remainder of the report.

Interesting facts:

- Nearly 12% of foreign-born residents were born in India
- Thirteen percent of all refugees who settled in Ohio in 2018 settled in the Dayton Region
- Two-thirds of regional residents who speak a non-English language speak English “very well”





EDUCATION

The education section includes data from K-12 public schools as well as higher education institutions data. In some cases, additional data beyond what was available from publicly available sources were included for select schools. This was based on the individual schools' responsiveness to data requests.

Interesting facts:

- Sixty-seven percent of K-12 Dayton Region students who study a world language study Spanish
- Over 1,100 students from institutions of higher education in the Dayton Region studied abroad in the 2017-2018 school year
- Forty-four percent of foreign-born residents have a bachelor's degree or higher, compared to 26% of those born in the U.S.









Global Entry

Dayton International Airport

The Dayton International Airport has the “International” designation due to having a U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP) facility on site, which allows right of entry and enables passengers to travel between countries. The U.S. Customs facility is able to clear corporate, private, military and international cargo aircrafts arriving directly from international departure points. This Office is a modernized general aviation facility, a port office, and a global entry enrollment center under one roof at the Dayton port of entry. U.S. Customs and Border Protection has a complex mission at ports of entry with broad law enforcement authorities tied to screening all foreign visitors, returning American citizens and imported cargo that enters the U.S. at more than 300 land, air and sea ports. Individuals seeking entry into the United States are inspected at Ports of Entry (POEs) by CBP officers who determine their admissibility.


